

Steel wool and a battery



When steel wool is between the poles of a battery, it starts to burn. This can be used to illustrate many biblical passages where fire occurs.

Material:

- Steel wool
- Sufficiently strong battery (a 4.5 V flat battery or a 9 V battery are suitable)

Experiment:

The steel wool is placed directly between the two poles so that it touches both.

The low voltage present in a battery is enough to ignite the steel wool.

Symbolically, the wool can be hung up so that it looks like a bush

Note: Steel wool can easily ignite and should not be thrown in the garbage together with combustible material.
